The Christian's Election and Exile—1 Peter 1:1-2

Elect'— [eklektos]— "Picked out, selected, chosen"
 The basis of our election The means of our election The purpose of our election "the <u>foreknowledge</u> of God the Father" "in the <u>sanctification</u> of the Spirit" "for <u>obedience</u> to Jesus Christ and for <u>sprinkling</u> with His blood."
Exiles'—[parepid ē mos]— An exile, a stranger, a pilgrim, a foreigner.
 Many of these Christians were exiles in a <i>literal</i> sense. Many were Jews while others were God-fearing Gentiles as well as those who had come to Christ from a pagan background.
• Peter's primary use of the term exile is intended to be taken in a <i>figurative</i> or <i>metaphorical</i> sense.
The Christian's Living Hope—I Peter 1:3-5
More than a Blessing: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ!"
• The Christian comes to properly view God's sovereign authority when God is understood as
\Rightarrow The sovereignty of God must not be viewed simply in terms of rote
⇒ The relationship between God the Father and Jesus the Son helps to color the Christian's understanding of the Fatherhood of God.
 Jesus is the <i>beloved</i> Son (John 3:35; 5:20) Jesus is the <i>only begotten</i> Son (John 1:14; 1 John 4:9) Jesus is the <i>firstborn</i> (Col. 1:18; Heb. 1:6) Jesus is <i>begotten</i> of the Father (Matt. 1:20; Acts 13:33)
"Living Hope" "According to his great mercy, he has caused us to be born again to a <u>living</u> <u>hope</u> through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead"
[elpis]— "Hope"— "A joyful and confident <u>expectation</u> "
[za ō]— "Living"— ""—This adjective expresses the <u>quality</u> of the hope.
What is our living hope? That "he has caused us to be born again"
The Basis for the Christian's Living Hope:

"...to an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, who by God's power are being guarded through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. "
