### Peter's Last Years: A Testimony From Silence

It's very difficult to piece together an outline for the events and locations of the last phase of Peter's life and ministry. Following the Jerusalem Council in Acts 15 and brief references by Paul in 1 Corinthians and Galatians, all we know of the end of Peter's life is derived from his epistles (1 & 2 Peter) and from the early church fathers.

#### Peter's Writings:

- ⇒ 1 Peter was written to declare to Christians the true grace of God and exhorting them to live in accordance with it in the midst of suffering during their time in exile (1:1-2; 5:12)
- ⇒ 2 Peter was written just before Peter's death to remind Christians of all they had in Christ (1:3-4) and that they were to live out these truths (1:12-14) so that they might be guarded from false teaching (2:1-22) as the awaited the return of Jesus (3:1-18).
- ⇒ It is also quite likely that Peter played a significant role in the writing of the Gospel of Mark. Given his close association with Mark (1 Pet. 5:13) as well as how he is portrayed throughout the Gospel, this is highly likely.

#### Peter in Rome:

- There are some who debate whether or not Peter was actually in Rome when he died.
- The earliest sources that we have outside of the Scriptures, however, indicate that it was there that he served during the last season of his life and was eventually martyred.

The Epistle of 1 Clement (95-97 AD)—Declared that Peter and Paul both suffered martyrdom.

<u>Ignatius of Antioch's Epistle to the Romans</u> (105-110 AD)—Seems to imply that both Peter and Paul served important roles in the church in Rome.

<u>Irenaeus' Against Heresies</u> (180 AD)—States directly that both Paul and Peter helped to establish the church at Rome.

#### John 21:18-19

"Truly, truly, I say to you, when you were young, you used to dress yourself and walk wherever you wanted, but when you are old, you will stretch out your hands, and another will dress you and carry you where you do not want to go." (This he said to show by what kind of death he was to glorify God.) And after saying this he said to him, "Follow me."

#### 2 Peter 1:13-15

"I think it right, as long as I am in this body, to stir you up by way of reminder, since I know that the putting off of my body will be soon, as our Lord Jesus Christ made clear to me. And I will make every effort so that after my departure you may be able at any time to recall these things."

Eusebius of Caesarea's Church History (Early 4th Century AD)— "Peter appears to have preached in Pontus, Galatia, Bithynia, Cappadocia, and Asia to the Jews of the dispersion. And at last, having come to Rome, he was crucified head-downwards; for he had requested that he might suffer in this way. What do we need to say concerning Paul, who preached the Gospel of Christ from Jerusalem to Illyricum, and afterwards suffered martyrdom in Rome under Nero? These facts are related by Origen in the third volume of his Commentary on Genesis."
