Introduction

- The writings of the NT bear the authority of God because they are inspired by the Holy Spirit.
- They Spirit does not, however, remove the personality of the human authors and it is therefore important to consider their biography in order to better understand the points of emphasis within their writings.

Within his letter, Jude focuses on the lordship of Jesus Christ as he writes to warn the recipients of the letter of the dangers of false gospels and false teachers which have become a threat to their faith.
