<u>Review</u>: A Penetrating Question \rightarrow "<u>What is happening in my life</u>?" A Biblical Fact \rightarrow "Spiritual Maturity demands Believer be Heavenly Minded!"

A. The First of Five Eternal Perspectives: Philippians 1:6

→God has begun a "<u>Good Work"</u> in my life which He is "<u>perfecting</u>" in my experience! *"For I am confident of this very thing, that He who began a <u>good work</u> in you <u>will perfect it</u> until the day of Christ Jesus."*

 B. <u>The Second of Five Eternal Perspectives</u>: Philippians 2:13
→God is at "<u>Work</u>" in my life producing "<u>Desire</u>" for the will of God enabling "<u>Faithful</u> <u>Obedience</u>" ("Being pleasing to Him")!
"For it is God who is at work in you, both to will and to work for His good pleasure."

C. The Third of Five Eternal Perspectives: Philippians 3:10

→God is at "<u>Work</u>" in every Believer to produce an "<u>Experiential Knowledge</u>" of His Son! "That I may <u>know Him</u> and the <u>power</u> of His resurrection and the <u>fellowship</u> of His sufferings, being <u>conformed</u> to His death."

The Fourth Eternal Perspective

"For our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, from which also <u>we eagerly wait</u> for a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ." Philippians 3:20

God is at "work" in every Believer to produce an accurate understanding of our citizenship (home)!

I. <u>The</u> "<u>of the Believer's "Citizenship" in Heaven</u>, Phil. 3:20.

"For our <u>citizenship</u> is in heaven, from which also we <u>eagerly wait</u> for a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ."

A. <u>The Historical Background</u>: The "_____" of the Philippians! 1. Philippi was a "______ ____" bringing great "______"

. Philippi was a "______" bringing great "_____"! "In 42 B.C. the Battle of Philippi was fought west of the city between the Second Triumvirate (Octavian, Antony, Lepidus) and the Republicans of Rome (Brutus, Cassius). The victory of Octavian resulted in Philippi being made a military colony. Following the Battle of Actium in 31 B.C., in which Octavian defeated Antony, the status of Philippi was raised . . . and later in 27 B.C. (to Roman colony) . . . The change in status provided the inhabitants with numerous advantages, including autonomous government, immunity from tribute, and treatment as if they actually lived in Italy . . . Philippi was the only (Roman) colony in the area (Macedonia)." --Homer Kent

2. This civic "_____" is seen in Luke's description in <u>Acts 16:12, 20-21</u>. "So putting out to sea from Troas, we ran a straight course to Samothrace, and on the day following to Neapolis; and from there to Philippi, which is a leading ('first, chief') city

of the district of Macedonia, <u>a Roman colony</u> . . . "

"... and when they had brought them to the chief magistrates, they said, 'These men are throwing our city into confusion, being Jews, and are proclaiming customs which is not lawful for us to accept or to observe, being <u>Romans</u>."

D. The "_____" of the Believer, Titus 2:11-14.

"For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all men, instructing us to deny ungodliness and worldly desires and to live sensibly, righteously and godly in the present age, looking for the **blessed hope** and the **appearing of the glory** of our great God and Savior, Christ Jesus, who gave Himself for us to redeem us from every lawless deed, and to purify for Himself a people for His own possession, zealous for good deeds."

Note: The faithful Believer in Jesus Christ is not so "Heavenly Minded" that we are "No Earthly Good"! Rather, we are able to be of "Earthly Good" because we are "Heavenly Minded"!

II. The " "of the Believer while away from "Home", Phil. 3:20.

"For our citizenship is in heaven, from which also we **eagerly wait** for a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ."

A. We have a progressive desire for the "_____" of Christ!

"... in order that I may attain to the resurrection from the dead," Phil. 3:11.

Note: The maturing Believer desires to be Jesus Christ! "Not that I have already obtained it or have already become perfect (mature), but I press on so that I may lay hold of that for which also I was laid hold of by Christ Jesus. Brethren, I do not regard myself as having laid hold of it yet; but one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and reaching forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus. Let us therefore, as many as are perfect (mature), have this attitude; and if in anything you have a different attitude, God will reveal it to you." Philippians 3:12-17

Question: What is the "goal", the "prize"? → "_____" with Christ in His "_____" glory! (John 17:4-5, 22-24)

B. We demonstrate the reality of being " "!

→ I have been "*laid hold of*" by Jesus Christ!

"For the love of Christ controls us, having concluded this, that one died for all, therefore all died; and He died for all, so that they who live might **no longer live for** themselves, but for Him who died and rose again on their behalf."

II Corinthians 5:14-15

III. <u>The Anticipation of the Believer's journey</u> "_____", Phil. 3:21.

"... who will <u>transform</u> the body of our humble state into <u>conformity</u> with the body of His glory, by the exertion of the <u>power</u> that He has even to <u>subject all things to</u> <u>Himself</u>."

- A. From our present "_____ state" to likeness to "His _____"!
 - -- "<u>humble</u>" = <u>tapeinoseos</u> = "lowliness, insignificant, humble"

-- "<u>conformity</u>" = <u>summorphoo</u> = "the changing of the inward and outward substance, conforming to or with something; to render like; to assimilate"

--<u>Expanded Translation</u>: Kenneth Wuest

"... who shall **<u>transform</u>** this body of ours which has been humiliated (by the presence of <u>sin</u> and <u>death</u> and <u>decay</u>), so that it will be <u>**conformed**</u> to His body of glory."

B. <u>Romans 8:18</u>

"For I consider that the <u>sufferings</u> of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the **glory** that is to be revealed to us."

C. I Corinthians 15:42-44, 51-54.

"So is the <u>resurrection</u> of the dead. It is sown a perishable body, it is raised an <u>imperishable</u> body; it is sown in dishonor, it is raised in <u>glory</u>; it is sown in weakness, it is raised in <u>power</u>; it is sown a natural body, it is raised a <u>spiritual</u> body. If there is a natural body, there is also a <u>spiritual</u> body."

"Behold, I tell you a <u>mystery</u>; we will not all sleep, <u>we will all be changed</u>, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet; for the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised <u>imperishable</u>, and <u>we all will be changed</u>. For this perishable must put on the <u>imperishable</u>, and this mortal must put on <u>immortality</u>. But when this perishable will have put on the <u>imperishable</u>, and this mortal will have put on <u>immortality</u>, then will come about the saying, 'Death is swallowed up in victory.' "

D. <u>I John 3:2-3</u>

"Beloved, now we are children of God, and it has not appeared as yet what we will be. We know that <u>when He appears</u>, <u>we will be like Him</u>, because <u>we will see him</u> just as He is. And everyone who has this <u>hope</u> fixed on Him purifies himself, just as He is pure."

A Probing Question

"What is my controlling concept of "<u>Home</u>"; where is my "<u>Citizenship</u>"? --"<u>Earth</u>" which brings <u>bondage</u> and <u>fear</u>; we are pressured to "<u>keep</u>" things! --"<u>Heaven</u>" which brings <u>freedom</u> and <u>anticipation</u>; we are free to "<u>let things</u> go"!

A Powerful Illustration

The well-known Christian hymn, "<u>I Have Decided To Follow Jesus</u>", was written by an Indian missionary named <u>Sadhu Sundar Singh</u>. He formulated the words from the life testimony of an Indian Christian named "<u>Nokseng</u>", a Garo man in the Meghalays tribe, living in "<u>Assam</u>", North-East India.

In the middle of the19th century, Christian missionaries came to "Assam" from England and Germany. Many tribes in that area were renowned for head-hunting! Nokseng and his family responded to the Gospel and became Christians. As a result, he was called to renounce his faith by the village chief, but declare, *"I have decided to follow Jesus."* His two children were killed by arrows because he refused to renounce his faith in Christ! When his wife was threatened, he continued, *"Though none go with me, still I will follow."* His wife was killed by arrows. Then he was executed while singing, *"The cross before me, the world behind me."* This display of faith is reported to have led to the conversion of the chief and others in the village.
