Introduction: Are we a soul or a body?

- C.S. Lewis is often wrongly said to have written that, "You do not have a soul. You are a soul. You have a body." Although his writings do not contain this quotation, it is possible he could have stated it somewhere given his affinity for the author George MacDonald who is quoted as saying, ""Never tell a child you have a soul. Teach him, you are a soul; you have a body."
- Although quotes such as these are intended to remind us of the impermanence of our current existence, they fall short of conveying the fullness of what the Scriptures teach about being made in God's image.

<u>Key Point</u>: Although we have been made new in our spirit, our redemption is incomplete until we have been renewed bodily as well. Thus, we live our lives in anticipation and hope of our _____!

The Holy Spirit: His Work

• We believe that the Holy Spirit will bring to completion the work of redemption begun in us and will effect the *resurrection* of our bodies in order that we might worship and serve the Lord for all eternity.

The Design & Purpose of Our Body

Gen. 1:27—So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.

Gen. 2:7—the Lord God formed the man of dust from the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living creature.

<u>Important Observations</u>

- Both body and soul must be understood to belong to the image of God in man.
- 2. Although body and soul may be referred to separately, they must be understood in reference to a single person.
- 3. The body was specifically designed by God to be the means by which the soul would be manifested in the world.
 - ⇒ For the worship of God (Gen. 2:15) and fellowship with Him (Gen. 3:8)
 - ⇒ For the stewarding (Gen. 1:28) and enjoyment of (Gen. 2:16, 24) creation.

Our Fallen Nature & the Death of Our Body

Gen. 3:17b, 19—cursed is the ground because of you...By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread, till you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken; for you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Rom. 8:24—Wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death?

Important Observations

- 1. The curse of God upon the physical world because of our sin is experienced in and through our bodies.
 - ⇒ We suffer the decay and breakdown of our bodies (Eccl. 12:1-8)
 - ⇒ We suffer physically (Exod. 3:7) and emotionally (Psa. 55:4) in the world.
- 2. Our own sinful nature is experienced in and through our bodies.
 - ⇒ When we experience temptation and fall into sin.

 <u>Iames 1:14-15</u>—¹⁴ But each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. ¹⁵ Then desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death.

The Incarnation & the Work of Redemption

John 11:25 — Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, **Important Observations**

- In the incarnation, the Lord Jesus forever added true humanity to His person in order that He might redeem it.
- The resurrection of the Lord Jesus shows that it is God's intention for mankind to dwell bodily with Him forever.
- 3. The resurrection of the Lord Jesus means that His people experience new life in Him.

1.	Just as our death is like that of, our resurrection will be like that of
	1 Cor. 15:20-22— ²⁰ But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. ²¹ For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. ²² For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive.
2.	Our resurrected body will be our true body that has been made
	1 Cor. 15:35-37— ³⁵ But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" ³⁶ You foolish person! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. ³⁷ And what you sow is not the body that is to be, but a bare kernel, perhaps of wheat or of som other grain.
3.	Our resurrected body will not be subject to physical
	1 Cor. 15:42-42—42 So is it with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable; what is raised is imperishable. ⁴³ It is sown in dishonor; it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness; it is raised in power.
4.	Our resurrected body will be animated by the rather than by biological processes.
	1 Cor. 15:44-49— ⁴⁴ It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual body. ⁴⁵ Thus it is written, "The first man Adam became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. ⁴⁶ But it is not the spiritual that is first but the natural, and then the spiritual. ⁴⁷ The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. ⁴⁸ As was the man of dust, so also are those who are of the dust, and as is the man of heaven, so also are those who are of heaven. ⁴⁹ Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we shall also bear the image of the man of heaven.
5.	Our resurrected body will be fit to serve God forever in the
	<u>1 Cor. 15:50-53</u> — ⁵⁰ I tell you this, brothers: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable. ⁵¹ Behold! I tell you a mystery. We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, ⁵² in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed. ⁵³ For this perishable body must put on the imperishable, and this mortal body must put on immortality.
<u>K</u>	<u>y Point</u> : The redemption of our body brings to the work of redemption that God began in us by the Spirit's work of regeneration and renewal.
