"The increase in distress due to social distancing that many Americans are experiencing is a normal response. Given that humans are a social species, this is our biology signaling a need to reconnect socially, just like hunger signals us to eat, and thirst signals us to drink water. Proximity to others, particularly trusted others, signals safety. When we lack proximity to trusted others our brain and body may respond with a state of heightened alert. This can result in increases in blood pressure, stress hormones, and inflammatory responses—which if experienced on an ongoing basis can put us at increased risk for a variety of chronic illnesses." — Julianne Holt-Lunstad, Health Affairs

	"church"—ἐκκλησία (ekklēsia)—Derived from two words: ek (out or from) and kaleō (to call). A gathering or an assembly. The term is used in the LXX of Israel as well as other gatherings; of Christians in the NT (a local assembly, those within a town or city, of all believers in heaven and earth).
	⇒ The church is comprised of those who have been out from the world and unto Christ.
