Affirming the Creed: Amen!

"amen" — A transliteration of the Heb. ንልፎ (ä·men). The term is derived from another Heb. word (ä·man') which means to show oneself firm, dependable, to be durable or to last. It can also mean to know oneself to be secure or to have faith.

The Use of 'Amen' in Scripture

1. To say 'amen' was to confirm a statement from someone else as certain, valid, and binding.

<u>1 Chron. 16:36</u>—Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting!" Then all the people said, "Amen!" and praised the Lord.

2. To say 'amen' was to express hope or desire that what was said would be accomplished.

<u>Ier. 28:6</u>—and the prophet Jeremiah said, "Amen! May the Lord do so; may the Lord make the words that you have prophesied come true, and bring back to this place from Babylon the vessels of the house of the Lord, and all the exiles.

3. In the gospels, 'amen' is found only in the mouth of Jesus.

Mark 10:15—"Truly, I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it."

John 3:3—"Jesus answered him, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born again he cannot see the kingdom of God."

"By introducing his words with amen Jesus labelled them as certain and reliable. He stood by them and made them binding on himself and his hearers. They are an expression of his majesty and authority." —Hans Bietenhard (NIDNTT)

4. In the epistles 'amen' appears at the close of prayers and doxologies.

Rom. 1:25—because they exchanged the truth about God for a lie and worshiped and served the creature rather than the Creator, who is blessed forever! Amen.

<u>1 Pet. 5:11</u>—*To him be the dominion forever and ever. Amen.*

<u>Key Point</u>: By responding to the truth of the Apostles' Creed with the word 'amen' we are declaring it to be a ______summation of the faith and recognizing our own personal connection to that truth.

"The 'amen' (meaning "truly, certainly") to which we come at last in the ancient baptismal creed is more than a period. It is an act of the whole body-soul unity, of trust, of confirmation. As the creed begins "I believe" (*credo*), it ends with, "Yes, so be it," "verily," "I confirm it" (*amen*)."
