## Introduction

Mark's gospel has introduced Jesus as the Messiah, the Son of God (1:1-15), describing the early receptivity to His ministry (1:16-2:12) as well as the increasing opposition to it (2:13-3:35). Although Jesus had begun to teach primarily in parables (4:1-34), He continued to perform powerful works that demonstrated His true identity and caused many to believe in Him (4:35-5:43).

"The triumphal progress of Jesus through the recent part of the narrative (since the explanatory discourse of chapter 4) is in danger of leaving the reader with a false security. One after another the forces of wind and water, demonic possession, illness, and even death have yielded to Hi a a
