	1. Their question makes sense in light of their previous success in this area of ministry but also reveals their own self-focus.
	"the disciples' question reveals that they are guilty of an "anxious self-concern" and a "misplaced" self-confidence." —David Garland, A Theology of Mark's Gospel
	2. Jesus' response to their question is intended as a subtle of their own lack of faith which was shown by their prayerlessness.
	"Prayer is essentially and attitude of utter dependence upon God. These men seem to have been trusting their previous experience or trusting the authority that had been conferred on them instead of depending on Christ and trusting Him to perform miracles through them." —Dwight J. Pentecost, The Words & Works of Jesus Christ
	Key Point: Jesus' words were intended to call the disciples to a relationship with God.

	"Mark is suggesting then that self-confident optimism may "feel" like faith, but it is in fact unbelief, because it disregards the prerequisite of human powerlessness and prayerful dependence on God." —Christopher Marshall, Faith as a Theme in Mark's Narrative
	oncluding Thoughts
	Believers are repeatedly in Scripture to live lives of dependent faith!
	1 Pet. 5:6-7—6 Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God so that at the proper time he may exalt you, ⁷ casting all your anxieties on him, because he cares for you
	1 Thess. 5:16-18— ¹⁶ Rejoice always, ¹⁷ pray without ceasing, ¹⁸ give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

- 2. In response to His question about the argument, a man came forward to tell Jesus about the condition of his son.
 - ⇒ The boy is experiencing demonic affliction and was perhaps <u>intentionally</u> brought to them.
 - "The son evidently had been brought as a test of the authority that belonged to Christ and as a test of the disciples as His representatives."

 - ⇒ The father highlighted the disciples' **inability** to cast out the demon.
- 3. Jesus' response was a statement of exasperation directed towards all who were around:

Key Point: Jesus' confidence in the Lord stands in contrast to the unbelief of all the others.

Observations:

Key Point: The father's dependence on Jesus for help is specifically highlighted within the account.

Observations:

- 1. Jesus' authority and power were demonstrated to the crowd as He drove out the demon from the boy.
- 2. Jesus' **compassion** was demonstrated in His raising up of the boy.

Key Point: Jesus' success in casting out the demon stands in contrast to the failure of his disciples.

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Mark 9:28-29—28 And when he had entered the house, his disciples asked him privately, "Why could we not cast it out?" ²⁹ And he said to them, "This kind cannot be driven out by anything but prayer."

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1. Their question makes sense in light of their previous success in this area of ministry but also reveals their own self-focus.

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Jesus' response to their question is intended as a subtle <u>rebuke</u> of their own lack of faith which was shown by their prayerlessness.

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Key Point: Jesus' words were intended to call the disciples to a deeper relationship with God.
