Introduction

After returning from the Mt. of The Transfiguration, Jesus had found the disciples arguing with some scribes and unable to cast a demon out of a boy who had been brought to them. Jesus demonstrated His power, authority, and compassion as Messiah by delivering the boy from affliction while also instructing His disciples as to the importance of prayerful dependence upon the Lord. As they returned briefly to Galilee, He continued to use various teachable moments to further prepare His disciples.

Lessons On Humility – Mark 9:30-50

Jesus' Teaching Concerning His Death & Resurrection (9:30-32)

- As they traveled again through Galilee, He taught them once more about His coming suffering.

 Observations:
 - 1. Jesus sought to travel apart from the crowds in order to have time alone with His disciples in order to teach them.
 - 2. He once again taught them specifically of His coming death and resurrection.
 - ⇒ His reference to Himself as the "Son of Man" is again intended to reframe their understanding of the work of Messiah.
 - * Their expectation of Messiah was that He would reign in great glory (Isa. 9:6-7)
 - * He taught them that <u>humiliation</u> would precede His <u>exaltation</u> (Isa. 53:7-9a; 10-11)
 - 3. The disciples, however, did not fully <u>understand</u> His teaching and were afraid to seek clarification.

 - 3. Jesus then taught them that if they were to be truly great, they must be the servant of all.
 - ⇒ He then used a child as an example to them:
 - * True service means caring for the needs of those that you gain nothing from.
 - * True service involves participating with God in the work that He is doing.

<u>Key Point</u>: Jesus taught His disciples to be characterized by an attitude of humility which should be <u>evident</u> in their care and concern for others.

Anyone Not Against Us Is For Us (9:38-41)

- John then spoke up and told Jesus about a man who was unknown to them but was casting out demons in Jesus' name.

 Observations:
 - 1. John's words reveal that the disciples were still concerned with their own <u>status</u> as His followers. "he was not following <u>us</u>"

2. Jesus' response to them was intended to expand their understanding of God's work in the world:

"the one who is not against us is for us"

"whoever gives you a cup...to drink because you belong to Christ..."

<u>Key Point</u>: Jesus taught His disciples to be characterized by an attitude of humility toward others who, although not of their number, were not their <u>enemies</u>.

Jesus then instructed them regarding the pernicious danger of sin.

Observations:

- 1. Jesus first warned the disciples of the possibility of <u>leading</u> others into sin.
 - "little ones"
- 2. Jesus then warned them about the **seriousness** of their own sin.

- 3. Jesus then used the example of salt in order to teach the disciples the importance of being set apart as His followers.
 - ⇒ Salt in the OT is associated with the sacrifices of the tabernacle (Lev. 2:13), those of the restored temple (Ezra 6:9), and those of the Millennial temple (Ezek. 43:24).
 - * To be Jesus' disciple is to live a life of sacrifice.
 - * The imagery of fire is likely a reference to the suffering that will be associated with following Him.
 - * They are to evidence that the are His followers in how they <u>respond</u> to suffering and in terms of how they <u>relate</u> to one another.

<u>Key Point</u>: Jesus taught His disciples to be characterized by an attitude of humility in terms of their own <u>Self-sacrifice</u>.
