Introduction

The Lord Jesus began the last week of His earthly life by entering Jerusalem and being hailed as Messiah. He then demonstrated His messianic authority through the cleansing of the temple and the cursing the fig tree. He then engaged with the religious and political leaders who questioned His authority and sought to trap Him in His words.

<u>Main Point</u>: The Lord's teaching about <u>hope</u> for the future and faithfulness in the <u>present</u> served to further prepare the people to receive Him as the promised Savior.

The Sadducees & the Resurrection of the Dead—Mark 12:18-27

• Having dealt with Pharisees up to this point, a number of men from the party of the Sadducees came to Him and questioned Him about the resurrection of the dead.

The Sadducees: The Pharisees:

Observations:

- 1. The hypothetical question posed by Sadducees was intended to use a clear teaching of Torah (*Levirate Marriage*—Deut. 25:5) to <u>mock</u> a doctrine that they did not believe was scriptural (the resurrection).
- 2. The Lord's response to the Sadducees revealed their lack of **knowlege** about Scripture and their lack of **faith** in the power of God.
 - * The Sadducees are <u>deceived</u> πλανάω (planaō) mistaken, wrong, self-deceived.
 - The Sadducees should believe that power of God can both raise the dead and transform them.
 - The transformation of our bodies means that our relationship to others will be changed.
 - (2) Marriage will be unnecessary because we will be like the angels who do not procreate.
 - * The Sadducees should recognize that the Scriptures teach that the dead still "<u>live</u>."

 <u>Exod. 3:6</u>—⁶ And he said, "<u>I am</u> the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

<u>Key Point</u>: Jesus' authoritative proclamations concerning the resurrection gave <u>assurance</u> to those who had hope in the power of God and the teachings of Scripture.

The Greatest Commandment—Mark 12:28-34

Jesus then engaged with an earnest scribe who asked Him about the greatest of the commandments of God.

Observations:

- 1. Jesus answered the scribes question with quotations from the OT which were to be the heart of Israel's faith and practice:

 <u>Deut. 6:4-5</u>—4 "Hear, Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord is one! ⁵ And you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength.

<u>Lev. 19:18b</u>—"... but you shall love your neighbor as yourself; I am the Lord."

"neighbor" - Love for one's neighbor flows naturally from love for God.

2. In his response to Jesus, the scribe demonstrated that he had taken to <u>heart</u> key teachings from the OT.

<u>1 Sam. 15:22</u>—And Samuel said, "Has the Lord as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices, as in obeying the voice of the Lord? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, and to listen than the fat of rams.

<u>Hos. 6:6</u>—For I desire steadfast love and not sacrifice, the knowledge of God rather than burnt offerings.

3. Jesus' response to the scribe was intended as both an encouragement and a provocation.

Key Point: Jesus' teaching concerning the OT Law was a clear <u>summary</u> that was intended to convey an impossible standard which would demonstrate for people their need for a Savior.

• Mark wants His audience to see that it is through Jesus that they can have hope for their future resurrection as they live faithfully in the present, loving God and others.

Concluding Thoughts

• Have we loved God as we ought? No!

1 John 4:10—In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins.

• As recipients of God's love, we can truly love others!

1 John 4:11-12—¹¹ Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. ¹² No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us.

We can look forward to an <u>eternity</u> of loving God and others in the New Creation!

Rev. 21:5-7 $^{-5}$ And he who was seated on the throne said, "Behold, I am making all things new." Also he said, "Write this down, for these words are trustworthy and true." ⁶ And he said to me, "It is done! I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end.
