The shadow and substance Esther entered into the "inner court of the king's palace" and was accepted into his presence with favor (Est. 4:16, 5:2). Jesus entered the true holy of holies in heaven and was accepted into the Father's presence to sit at the right hand of the throne of God (Heb. 9:24, 10:12). The shadow and substance Esther's acceptance by the king meant the salvation of her people plus many
		Gentiles turning in faith as well (Est. 8:17). Jesus' acceptance by the Father meant the salvation for Israel (Matt. 15:24) plus many Gentiles turning (and are turning) in faith to the true God (Acts 11:18).
