

Daniel & the Den of Lions—Daniel 6:1-13

The Limits of the King's Power (6:14-18)

Observations

I. Daniel's antagonists successfully leveraged governmental **power** in order to try to destroy him.

"...no injunction...that the king establishes can be changed."

2. In spite of the king's concern for Daniel, he did not have the <u>authority</u> to deliver him and was even compelled to enact his punishment.

"he set his mind to deliver Daniel."

3. The king seemed to believe that Daniel's God did have the power to rescue him.

"May your God whom you serve continually, deliver you."

"Although there is insufficient evidence to conclude that Darius truly believed in Yahweh God alone, his words seem to indicate that he had at least come to a point of esteeming Daniel's God (probably as a result of Daniel's life and witness." —J. Paul Tanner

Key Point: Daniel's ultimate hope for deliverance could not be found in a political leader or system.

The Righteous Judgment of God (6:19-24)

Observations

I. The deliverance of Daniel was a public **demonstration** of God's power.

"My God sent his angel and shut the lions' mouths"

⇒ The phrase "his angel" (Ar. - *mal akeb*) used here is the same used by Nebuchadnezzar to describe the deliverance of Daniel's friends from the fiery furnace, suggesting that their Deliverer and Daniel's are one and the same (the preincarnate Christ)!

Dan. 3:18—"Blessed be the God of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, who has sent his angel and delivered his servants..."

2. Daniel's deliverance was a public <u>vindication</u> of him before the king as well as his antagonists.

"I was found blameless before him; and also before you, O king"

3. Having seen Daniel publicly vindicated, the king brought public judgment upon his antagonists.

Implications for Biblical Eschatology (Future Events)

Because of their relationship to Messiah, God's people will ultimately be delivered from their enemies and will inherit the Kingdom that He will establish.

Because of their relationship to the End-Time Antagonist (Antichrist), unbelievers will receive the righteous wrath of God.

These two were thrown alive into the lake of fire that burns with sulfur. ²¹ And the rest were slain by the sword that came from the mouth of him who was sitting on the horse, and all the birds were gorged with their flesh.
