<u>Main Point</u>: Through Christian marriage, God intends to picture both the <u>love</u> that He has for His people and the reconciling power of the <u>gospel</u>.

What Does Marriage Picture?

The Original Image of Marriage—Gen. 2:20b-25

• The original creation of the first man and woman was with the intent of them being brought together in marriage.

- 1. The man was unable to carry out the Lord's purposes in that state because there was no $\underline{\textbf{helper}}$ fit for him. "helper" "fit"
- 2. That the Lord **built** the woman from the rib taken from the man's side is significant:

"God chose to make Eve from the rib of man, He did not take her from Adam's head that she should rule over him...[or] from his foot that he should trample over her; but from the rib that she might protect his heart." - Hebrew Adage

- 3. That the Lord **brought** the woman to the man has important implications:
- 4. The man's words indicate that he recognized that they had been made as a **complements** to one another.

"Their difference is complementary, but asymmetrical; this is not a mirror image or a polar opposite. She resembles him in their shared humanity— "bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh"—but differs in the feminine form of her humanity. Genesis affirms the balance of sameness and difference between the sexes." — Abigail Favale, *The Genesis of Gender*

5. The concluding statements explain God's original **intent** for marriage:

<u>Key Point</u>: God's love for the man and woman was intended to be <u>demonstrated</u> in how they were to express love and to give themselves fully to one another.

The Shattered Image of Marriage—Gen. 3:1-13

• The deceitfulness of the serpent and the willing sin of our first parents introduced <u>brokenness</u> into the harmonious relationships that existed in the garden.

Observations

1.	The introduction	of the figures	in this account	anticipates th	he disordering	of what God has	rightly ordered
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- The serpent's attack was directed at the woman's confidence in God's Word and her identity in relation to Him.
- 3. The account implies their **failure** to fulfill the roles God intended for them in marriage:
 - Adam failed in his role as protector ---
 - Eve failed in her role as helper →
- 4. Their **reactions** following their sin indicated that the prior harmony of their relationships had been undone.

5. The Lord promised to ultimately rescue them but also that they would be prone to **conflict** over His good design for them in marriage.

Gen. 3:15—I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel.

Gen. 3:16b—Your desire shall be contrary to your husband, but he shall rule over you.

<u>Key Point</u>: The promise of the coming Rescuer implied the continued goodness of marriage but also the need for deliverance from their enemies of Satan, sin, and death.

The Restored Image of Marriage—Eph. 5:22-33

• How a wife <u>views</u> and <u>responds</u> to her husband is intended to picture the relationship between the Church and Christ.

Exhortation: "Wives, submit to your own husbands"

How? "...as to the Lord."

- * A person's relationship to Christ is based on **trust**.
- * A person should arrange their lives under His **authority**.

Why? "For the husband is the head of the wife even as Christ is the head of the church and is himself its Savior."

- ⇒ Messiah has taken **responsibility** for the church.
- ⇒ Messiah has a position of **headship** over the church.
- How a husband <u>loves</u> and <u>cares</u> for his wife is intended to picture the relationship between Christ and the Church.

Exhortation: "Husbands, love your wives..."

How? "...as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her..."

- ⇒ Messiah's love for the church was **self-sacrificial**.
- ⇒ Messiah's love for the church was shown in His ministering of the **Word** to her.
- ⇒ Messiah's love for the church was for the purpose of her **flourishing** for God's glory.

Why? "...husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself."

- Husbands should not <u>disfavor</u> their wives.
- * Husbands should: (1) Nourish
- (2) Cherish
- Christian marriage is a mysterious analogy for the <u>union</u> that Christ has with the Church.

Eph. 5:31-32—31 "Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh." 32 This mystery is profound, and I am saying that it refers to Christ and the church.

<u>Key Point</u>: Christian marriage is intended by God to picture the work of <u>reconciliation</u> that Christ has accomplished in restoring the original relationships broken at the fall.

(1) God & Man reconciled!

(2) Man & Woman reconciled!

Concluding Thoughts

1. Satan hates marriage in general and Christian marriage in particular and so when we find aspects of marriage to be difficult, this should not be surprising.

1 Pet. 5:8—Be sober-minded; be watchful. Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour.

2. Our union with Christ is the <u>source</u> from which we draw all that we need to honor God and one another in our marriage.

1 Pet. 5:9—Resist him, firm in your faith, knowing that the same kinds of suffering are being experienced by your brotherhood throughout the world.
