Introduction

Biblically, one of the primary reasons that God instituted marriage was His intent for it to be the context in which children were both conceived and reared. The physical union of a man and woman does not always result in the conception of a child, but it is procreative by design. A father and mother are therefore intended to play a primary role in how children are nurtured and instructed as they grow and children are to honor their parents throughout the days of their lives.

Mothers & Fathers

A Common Charge

• Fathers and Mothers are exhorted to be <u>diligent</u> in the faithful rearing of their children.

<u>Deut. 6:4-7</u>—⁴ "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. ⁵ You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. ⁶ And these words...shall be on your heart. ⁷ You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.

- 1. Parents are to themselves **know** and **love** the Lord.
- 2. Parents are to **teach** their children to know and love the Lord.

"diligently"— שָׁנָ (shanan) — Lit. to sharpen or whet, to pierce; Fig. to sharpen or teach incisively.

<u>Key Point</u>: Fathers and mothers should have a sense of their own <u>identity</u> as God's people and their parenting should form their children within that same identity.

Complimentary Roles

- The Lord's instructions to parents are based on the unique <u>roles</u> that they have in the lives of their children. <u>Eph. 6:4</u>— Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.
 - Fathers are uniquely positioned to <u>discourage</u> their children.
 "provoke...to anger"—παροργίζω (*parorgizō*) Lit. 'to anger alongside.' To rouse to wrath, to provoke, exasperate, anger.
 - Fathers are uniquely positioned to help their children grow.
 "bring...up" ἐκτρέφω (*ektrephō*) to rear up to maturity; to cherish or train, to bring up.
