



Part 27—"God's Comfort Through His People"— 26 May 2024

Introduction

Paul and his co-workers do not lose heart even as they minister in difficult circumstances, knowing that they will stand one day before Christ to receive their eternal reward. This changes their perspective on both themselves and others. As those who have been reconciled to God, they call upon others to walk in that reconciliation and therefore not be yoked together with unbelievers in their idolatry. Paul has been encouraged by the Corinthians and he now reflects on how God has comforted him by His work through them and through his co-worker, Titus.

Main Point: God's comfort often comes to His people through our _____ with one another as we ____ to His work in our lives.

The Situation in Corinth

Based on a negative report from Timothy, Paul himself made a "_____" visit to Corinth.

"This turned into a distressing confrontation...[and] it is quite clear that animus against Paul was still very strong and focused on one or two leaders whom the Corinthians either tacitly supported or refused to condemn...From Paul's perspective at the time, the "painful visit" (2 Cor. 2:1) was a complete fiasco. At least one of the opponents had attacked him in deeply insulting ways (2 Cor. 2:5-8, 10; 7:12); worse, the work of the gospel was in serious jeopardy." —Carson & Moo, *An Intro to the New Testament*

The church had also at this time been infiltrated by false _____ <u>who opposed Paul.</u>

"About the same time...the church had been invaded by some self-designated Christian leaders. Probably they called themselves apostles (2 Cor. II:I3-I5) and carried letters of recommendation with them (2 Cor. 3:I-3)...they were probably apostles in the general sense that they were agents of others who had commissioned them. Possibly they were in some way Judaizers, that is, those who were trying to bring the church more into line with Jewish piety and practice (2 Cor. 11:16)...despite any Jewish background they enjoyed (2 Cor. 11:21-22), they were deeply inte-grated into Greco-Roman life." —Carson & Moo, An Intro to the New Testament

Following the "painful" visit, Paul felt compelled to write them a "__ _____" letter and send it by way of Titus.

"Written 'out of great distress and anguish of heart and with many tears' (2 Cor. 2:4), this letter assured the Corinthians of Paul's love for them but also laid down the standards he expected in the churches in his charge and sought to determine if they would meet those standards(2:9)... Delivered by Titus (who may have been a more forceful person than Timothy), this letter demanded the punishment of the ringleader who had maligned and opposed Paul so maliciously (2:3-9; 7:8-12)." —Carson & Moo, *An Intro to the New Testament*

Paul in Macedonia

Though he had intended to meet ______ in Troas, he headed on to Macedonia.

"Paul left Troas and headed for Macedonia (2:13); apparently, he had established a contingency plan to meet Titus there, should the meeting at Troas not take place. In Macedonia Paul pursued both hist pastoral ministry (Acts 20:I-2) and his organization of the collection for the Jerusa-lem believers (2 Cor. 8:I-4; 9:2). These churches were themselves facing 'a very severe trial' and 'extreme poverty' (8;2), owing not least to active persecution; but worse still, from Paul's perspective, was that Titus had not yet shown up, so he had no idea how his 'severe' letter had been received in Corinth." -Carson & Moo, An Intro to the New Testament

The arrival of Titus with news from Corinth was a great _

to Paul's heart.

"Titus soon arrived, and Paul's distress rapidly changed to near euphoria (2 Cor. 7:6-7). Immediately after sending the severe letter, he had suffered second thoughts, fearing that he might hurt the Corinthians unduly; but with Titus' encouraging report, Paul's fear was displaced by joy...Indeed, Paul's entire response in 1-9, breathes an atmosphere of bruised relations that have recently eased."—Carson & Moo

2 Corinthians 7:2-7:16

Exposition

"comfort"—παρακαλέω (parakaleō)— lit. to 'exhort alongside'...the act of emboldening another in belief or course of action, encouragement, exhortation; lifting of another's spirits, to comfort, to console.

- \Rightarrow Paul was comforted by God even in the midst of their afflictions (7:4-5)
- \Rightarrow The arrival of Titus with news from Corinth was the means by which they were comforted (7:6-7)
- \Rightarrow Titus was himself comforted by the response of the Corinthians to his visit (7:13)

Key Point: At times, the simple ______ of our brothers and sisters in Christ is a means by which God can encourage us.

3. The Corinthians had ______ rightly to his 'severe' letter.

<u>2 Cor. 7:10-11</u>—¹⁰ For godly grief produces a repentance that leads to salvation without regret, whereas worldly grief produces death. ¹¹ For see what earnestness this godly grief has produced in you, but also what eagerness to clear yourselves, what indignation, what fear, what longing, what zeal, what punishment! At every point you have proved yourselves innocent in the matter.

 \Rightarrow Paul had spoken the ______ to them in ______ and the Lord had been gracious to convict them of sin. They had repented and were bearing fruit in keeping with that repentance.

4. Titus' testimony of all that God had done in Corinth _____ Paul of the Corinthians affections for him.

<u>2 Cor. 7:13b-16</u>—And besides our own comfort, we rejoiced still more at the joy of Titus, because his spirit has been refreshed by you all. ¹⁴For whatever boasts I made to him about you, I was not put to shame. But just as everything we said to you was true, so also our boasting before Titus has proved true. ¹⁵And his affection for you is even greater, as he remembers the obedience of you all, how you received him with fear and trembling. ¹⁶I rejoice, because I have complete confidence in you.

Key Point: The Corinthians' ______ was indicative of their receptivity to the word of the Lord and correction.
