Introduction: Defining "Apostle"

"The office of apostle was limited to the Twelve and to Paul...The qualifications for the office of apostle are set forth in Acts I:21-22; those holding to the office had to have walked with the Lord from the baptism of John until the ascension of Christ. Paul's situation was unique; he referred to himself as an apostle, but one "untimely born" (I Cor. 15:8-9)."

—Peter Enns, The Moody Handbook of Theology

"The apostles received the Gospel for us from the Lord Jesus Christ; Jesus Christ was sent forth from God. So then Christ is from God, and the apostles are from Christ. Both, therefore, came of the will of God in the appointed order."—Clement of Rome (AD 1st c.)

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"['Apostle' as a gift] was a foundational gift limited to the formation of the church (Eph. 2:20). When the foundation of the church was laid, the need for the gift ceased. The word <i>apostle</i> is also used in a general sense of a "messenger" or a "sent one" in the cause of Christ. These are referred to as apostles but do not have the office or gift. The word is used in a nontechnical sense of one who is a messenger (Acts I4:I4; 2 Cor. 3:23; Phil. 2:25)." —Peter Enns, <i>The Moody Handbook of Theology</i>

2 Corinthians II:I2-2Ia
Context
Having changed his tone in the letter, Paul confronts the Corinthians directly about their tolerance of the presence of false teachers in their midst. He exhorts them to judge for themselves whether it is the false teachers or Paul and his co-workers who minister after the example of the Lord Jesus. He then sets to work subverting the boasting of these false teachers and exposing them for what they truly are.
Exposition
I. Paul draws a clear contrast between himself and the false teachers by identifying who it is they truly (II:I2-I4)
2 Cor. II:12—And what I am doing I will continue to do, in order to undermine the claim of those who would like to claim that in the boasted mission they work on the same terms as we do.
⇒ The purpose of Paul's boasting is to "" the boasting of the false teachers.
⇒ These false teachers have claimed to be doing the same kind of apostolic work that Paul and his co-workers are engaged in. "their boasted mission"
The Reality: They are at best, and outright at worst!
(I) They are apostles!
(2) They are workmen!



CORINTHIANS

2 Corinthians II:I2-2Ia

Context

Having changed his tone in the letter, Paul confronts the Corinthians directly about their tolerance of the presence of false teachers in their midst. Exposition

- (2) These teachers conceal their true identity and present themselves as servants of 'righteousness.'

'Ministers of righteousness' are those who live righteously, not those who purport to be righteous or to preach a righteous message...they renounce shameful things and deceitful practices (4:2). Key Points: At times, evil must be named in order that it might be confronted.

We are to judge Christian leaders by the example of Christ and the teaching of Scripture.

2. Paul then justifies his concerns for the Corinthians and his claims about the false teachers. (II:I6-2Ia)

2 Cor. 11:16-18—¹⁶ I repeat, let no one think me foolish. But even if you do, accept me as a fool, so that I too may boast a little.
¹⁷ What I am saying with this boastful confidence, I say not as the Lord would but as a fool. ¹⁸ Since many boast according to the flesh, I too will boast.

⇒ Paul resumes the subversion of the false teachers by 'boasting' as they do. He recognizes this is 'foolishness,' however, and makes an important clarification.

"boastful <u>confidence</u>"—ὑπόστασις (hypostasis)—a plan or project; a situation, condition, or frame of mind.

"not as the Lord would but as a fool"

⇒ Out of reverence for Christ, he makes sure to clarify that his actions in boasting are not following in the example of Christ, but are mimicking the false teachers for rhetorical effect.

"...it is only their gullibility vis-à-vis the claims of the false apostles that forces him to boast at all. But even if they do regard his boasting as the act of a fool, let them accept him as such, and listen to his boasting as they have listened to the boasting of the other fools (his opponents) whom they have received."—Colin Kruse

<u>2 Cor. II:19</u>— For you gladly bear with fools, being wise yourselves!

- ⇒ Paul loves the Corinthians enough to confront their own <u>misguided</u> view of themselves and the results that it has produced.
- ⇒ The false teachers are causing active <u>harm</u> in their midst, wittingly or unwittingly doing the work of Satan.

"make slaves of you" "devours you"

"takes advantage of you" "puts on airs"

"strikes you in the face"

These men are like their father, the devil. He makes use of the enslaving power of sin (Rom. 6:12,14). He actively seeks those to devour (I Pet. 5:8). He seeks to gain an advantage (2 Cor. 2:11) in our lives. He is haughty (Isa. 14:14) and seeks to kill and destroy (John 10:10).

Key Points: Confrontation can be a good thing when done according to Scripture and for our good or that of others.

We must be discerning of which leaders we follow and what their influence is upon us.

Concluding Thoughts

- We must be careful to distinguish between doctrinal 'error' and 'false' teaching.
- It is often easier for us to identify the influence of evil outside of the church that it is inside of the church.
