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Lessons from Jeremiah 10:1-14

Jeremiah's Ministry:

1.	God's people are exhorted not to themselves the way that unbelievers do. (10:2) "learn not the way of the nations"— derek — lit. a way, manner, or habit; fig. a course of life.
	We are not to become!
	We are not to become by the things that trouble them!
2.	Idolatry is foolish because it has no lasting to it. (10:3) "the customs of the peoples are <u>vanity</u> "—hebel —lit. vapor, breath; fig. vanity, temporary

	* Idols are things that can be used for good, but become evil when we value them above our Creator. (10:4)
	* We need not fear the idols that the world worships because they cannot cause us harm. (10:5)
3.	The danger of idolatry is that we become like what we <u>Jer. 10:8</u> —They are both <u>stupid and foolish</u> ; the instruction of idols is but wood!
	<u>Jer. 10:14-15</u> —Every man is <u>stupid and without knowledge</u> ; every goldsmith is put to shame by his idols, for his images are false, and there is no breath in them.
4.	Instead of worshiping idols as do the nations, God's people are to worship the over all nations! <u>Ier. 10:7</u> —Who would not fear you, O King of the nations? For this is your due; for among all the wise ones of the nations and in all their kingdoms there is none like you.
	We are to the Lord, and not the political and religious idols of unbelievers!
5.	Unlike the idols of the world, the Lord can affect and change in us and the world. <u>Jer. 10:10</u> —But the Lord is the true God; he is the living God and the everlasting King. At his wrath the earth quakes, and the nations cannot endurable in his indignation.

- * We need not fear the idols that the world worships because they cannot cause us <u>eternal</u> harm. (10:5)
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Jer. 10:8—They are both stupid and foolish; the instruction of idols is but wood!

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4. Instead of worshiping idols as do the nations, God's people are to worship the King over all nations!

<u>Jer. 10:7</u>—Who would not fear you, O King of the nations? For this is your due; for among all the wise ones of the nations and in all their kingdoms there is none like you.

We are to revere the Lord, and not the political and religious idols of unbelievers!

5. Unlike the idols of the world, the Lord can affect <u>real</u> and <u>lasting</u> change in us and the world.

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<u>Key Point</u>: We must resist the temptation to misuse good things given by God by making them into ultimate things that we place our hope in and orient our lives around.
