Soteriology Defined
"Soteriology is that portion of Systematic Theology which treats of salvation. Salvation: Forgiveness & Deliverance
The birth narratives affirm the necessity of salvation for sinful humanity.
1. The words of the angel to Joseph concerning the Lord Jesus.
Matt. 1:20-21— 20 But as he considered these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. 21 She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."
"Jesus"— The Gk. "Iēsous" is a transliteration of the Hebrew and Aramaic Yeshua or "Joshua." This word combines ya, an abbreviation for the name Yahweh (the name of Israel's God, often rendered "the LORD" in our Bibles), and the verb yasha, meaning to "save" or "deliver." Thus, the name means "the LORD is salvation" or "Yahweh saves."
⇒ In the OT, this name is associated with individuals used of God to deliver His people (Joshua the son of Nun—Jos. 24:14-14) and to cleanse them of sin and mediate on their behalf (Joshua the son of son of Jehozadak—Zech. 3:4).
Key Point: The Savior's name associated Him with great and works of deliverance in the OT, anticipating the greater work He had come to accomplish.
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2. The words of Zechariah concerning the work of his son John & the coming of Messiah.

<u>Luke 1:68-69</u>—68 "Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has visited and redeemed his people 69 and has raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David,

<u>Luke 1:76-79</u>—76 And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways, 77 to give knowledge of salvation to his people in the forgiveness of their sins, 78 because of the tender mercy of our God, whereby the sunrise shall visit us from on high 79 to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace."

<u>Key Point</u>: Deliverance from _____ is a necessary prerequisite in order for the fullness of salvation to be experienced by God's people.
