Psalm 125

The Israelite and his companions call upon the Lord to continue to protect and bless His people and to bring about His promised peace upon them forever.

• The psalmist declares the assurance the faithful have in the Lord's protection and security. (v. 1-3)

<u>Psa. 125:1-3</u>—¹ Those who trust in the Lord are like Mount Zion, which cannot be moved, but abides forever. ² As the mountains surround Jerusalem, so the Lord surrounds his people, from this time forth and forevermore. ³ For the scepter of wickedness shall not rest on the land allotted to the righteous, lest the righteous stretch out their hands to do wrong.

Gospel Parallel: "Wisdom from the Sermon on the Mount" - Luke 6:43-49
