"Psalm 132 & The Triumphal Entry" 6 April 2025

Introduction: "Joy" & "Hope" in Today's World

We have repeatedly observed that the Psalms of Ascent include multiple themes that address the varied experiences of life. Although the time in which we live differs greatly from the time in which these psalms were composed, the desires of the human heart remain fundamentally the same. People wish to experience joy in life and they desire to live with hope for the future.

<u>Main Point</u>: Our lives can be characterized by true <u>joy</u> and <u>hope</u> because of God's presence with us and His promises to us.

Psalm 132

The pilgrims reflect upon the entry of the ark into Zion and the pray for God to fulfill His promises made to David.

• They recall together David's vow to the Lord and call upon Him to honor it. (v. 1-5)

<u>Psa. 132:1-3,5</u>—¹ Remember, O Lord, in David's favor, all the hardships he endured, ² how he swore to the Lord and vowed to the Mighty One of Jacob, ³ "I will not enter my house or get into my bed...5 until I find a place for the Lord, a dwelling place for the Mighty One...

⇒ Although this specific vow of David is not found in Scripture, there is important OT background to consider: *Jacob's vow probably stands in the background* (Gen. 28:16-22)
"The Mighty One of Jacob"

David had desired to build the temple (2 Sam. 7:1-5)

"In such a dwelling place the glorious presence of the Lord would remain in the midst of the people, and not move about in a portable shrine." — Allen P. Ross

They worship together as they reenact the coming of the ark to Jerusalem. (v. 6-10).

<u>Psa. 132:7-10</u>—7 "Let us go to his dwelling place; let us worship at his footstool!" ⁸ Arise, O Lord, and go to your resting place, you and the ark of your might. ⁹ Let your priests be clothed with righteousness, and let your saints shout for joy. ¹⁰ For the sake of your servant David, do not turn away the face of your anointed one.

⇒ The desire of the psalmist is to worship God in the presence of His glory. *The imagery recalls David bringing the ark into the city* (2 Sam. 6:17-19)

"his footstool...the ark"

⇒ They anticipate God's blessing upon His people and their king.

"priests" "anointed"

• The Lord responds to His worshipers by reiterating the promises of the Davidic Covenant (v. 11-12).

Psa. 132:11—The Lord swore to David a sure oath from which he will not turn back: "One of [your] sons...I will set on your throne."

- ⇒ God had promised that He would establish David's house before Him forever (2 Sam. 7:12-16)
- The Lord affirms His promises and centers them on the coming of Messiah (v. 13-18).

<u>Psa. 132:14-18</u>—¹⁴ "This is my resting place forever; here I will dwell, for I have desired it. ¹⁵ I will abundantly bless her provisions; I will satisfy her poor with bread. ¹⁶ Her priests I will clothe with salvation, and her saints will shout for joy. ¹⁷ There I will make a horn to sprout for David; I have prepared a lamp for my anointed. ¹⁸ His enemies I will clothe with shame, but on him his crown will shine."

- 1. God will dwell among His people forever.
- 2. God will bless them abundantly.
- 3. God's people will experience the fullness of His salvation.

- 4. Messiah will rule the people with power and wisdom.
- 5. Messiah will rule the nations for the glory of God and the good of His people.

Key Point: God intends for His presence and His promises to bless His people both now and forever.

Gospel Parallel: "The Triumphal Entry" — Luke 19:28-40

Background: The Lord Jesus began the last week of His earthly life and ministry with a public demonstration of who He was as Messiah to the joyous praises of His people and the consternation of His enemies.

- 1. Before the public presentation of Himself as Messiah, the Lord once again demonstrated the <u>authority</u> of His Word.
- 2. The Lord's actions appropriated important OT prophetic imagery for those who had ears to hear and eyes to see.
